- Monmouth County Fair Report: Geff Vitale summarized the Fair details:
 - o 50,000 People in attendance due to excellent weather
 - o Extended fair hours enhanced result
 - o Approximately 30 volunteers worked the daily shifts
 - Sold 367 jars of honey, 79 (2lb.) jars, 232 bears, 48 Hot honey, 56 Comb honey, 7,800 Honey sticks,
 144 Hand Creams, 242 Lip balms, assorted candles
 - o Bees for the Observation hive were supplied by Sallie Toscano
 - Over 1,000 brochures were handed out
 - o Total Revenue in: \$9,285.00, Expenses: \$5,358.00, Profit: \$3,927.00
 - o Geff projected a comparison from 2016-2019. 2019 was the most profitable year.
- 50/50: \$57.00
- Election Committee: Pat will appoint members of the Election Committee who will prepare the election for November.
- Beekeeping Course: Jeff Burd will be instructing the course on Saturday, September 21, from 8am to 4pm at the Agriculture Building in Freehold and Sunday, October 6th in South Brunswick. Pizza will be served for lunch
- Index Card questions included the following topics which were discussed: Winter Care, Ventilation and Oxalic Acid.
- Presentation: Frank Licata: "Queen Rearing"
 - o Egg must be one day old (not a "C" shape)
 - o Create a Starter Colony (5 frame Nuc box) and a Finisher Colony
 - o Put a screen on the bottom of the Starter Colony
 - o Fill the Starter Colony with nurse bees which can be from different hives

- O Add a pollen frame, a frame of honey/nectar, a wet sponge and cover the hive. Do this step in the morning so that the bees know they are queenless.
- o Therefore in the Starter Colony, there is no queen, no brood and no opening.
- o Meanwhile, set up your grafting area with the grafting frame, cell bars, grafting cups, damp towels, grafting tools, a bright light and magnifying glasses.
- o Put the grafting frame between the honey and pollen frames.
- After 24 hours, open and observe the grafting frame. Bees should be drawing wax on potential queen cells.
- The Finisher Colony is a queen right, 2 deep hive. The queen must be in the bottom box (use your queen excluder). Put open brood on each side of the graft frame and provide food.
- o By using a Cloake board (plywood) it is possible to make a 2 deep colony both a Starter and a Finisher colony.
